OHSG014 Safe Slinging Techniques

A High Risk Work Licence Class DG is required for persons who carry out Dogging work. Dogging work is defined as "the application of slinging techniques, including the selection and inspection of lifting gear to safely sling a load, or directing a plant operator in the movement of a load when the load is out of the operator's view". This 4 Hour Course is for persons who use slings but do not hold a DG qualification. The course is an ideal pre-entry training program to prepare participants with knowledge and skills required to undergo further training for class DG Licence. The Course is a Duty of Care short course designed to meet WHS Obligations for training and covers the following topics:

- Site Hazards
- Lifting Gear and Sling Types
- Hooks, Shackles and Accessories
- Slinging Methods and Moving Loads
- Personal Protective Equipment
- Job Planning
- Care and Inspection of Slings
- Load Factors and Calculations
- Load Handling and Site Rules
- Practical Slinging using a Crane
